Dear Sir

Since my last of 7th July of which herewith a copy I have received your favors of 16th Aug, 20th, 21st Oct and 18th November

I sent you per Bee & per Hamilton the pamphlet containing the negotiation between this government and the U.S. in English, herewith goes the remainder - I think you will agree with me that my harsh enemy Mr Baylies deserves a pension from the King of England, for having so zealously defended his rights to the Falkland Islands, and probably was thereby the cause of the English taking possession - My own individual interest will certainly not suffer by it - but to the U.S and Buenos Ayres this can certainly not suit in a political point of view, because England has taken the system and given them the shell - These are the direct consequences of not respecting properly the rights of a weaker nation. Had the President of the U.S. from the beginning considered the case in its true light, namely, that the American sealers were transgressing the laws of B.A. and were therefore detained, such disputes would never have arisen - However I am inclined to believe as I say in my report to government that Mr Baylies has exceeded his instructions, that he had no such instructions from the President as he pretended - All will now ^{soon} come to light, since so able a man as S. D. Adams is looking into the matter before Congress -

In a few days a vessel will go to Philadelphia with that I shall write more - meanwhile I remain
