Dear Sir,

Your favors of 31st May, 9th & 16th June are all duly to hand, and would have been earlier replied to but from the hope of being enabled in this to have communicated some definitive arrangements which are delayed by the indecision of our Govt whom however I shall not allow to flag unreasonably, without doors I am bringing the subject into very general and favorable notice, &c

I now go through your letter & make the necessary inquiries and replies thereto.

1st The Paragon which you allude, I do not find any in the Letter Book & thus infer it was some minor matter written after the copy was taken, and which I cannot now bring to mind.

2nd You infer from yours of 9th June that the wild horses on the East Falklands are there of no utility, as you send others from Buenos Ayres, is it only at a particular season that the Climate winds or some other cause admit of your using the cost of a good horse on land there?

3rd I wish your estimate and report on the stock of cattle Horses &c, now on the Island, your report &c, on the quantity of Fur seals & Whales which might be properly & without amputation be taken in 12 months.

4th You infer from your 16th June stating that such a sort of climate of agricultural & other operations by Land & Water throughout the year & whether the winter is more severe than in the North of England the summer months are the winter, sufficient long enough & the heat great enough to a great extent ripening & housing of grain with risk of being blown down & destroyed, &c, any ever been known what sort & with what result?

5th I have made three appropriations, which of course must for the present remain in abeyance.

6th I wish you to send me by ship in a parcel a corrected map & sounding of those I have from Langdon be not correct. If your N.B. to Letter of 9th June is very important from a recent interview I have had with our Secy of State there, thus I wish you to forward me every Document you there allude to as also one of the oldest grants assigned to me such as might bearing date not many weeks subsequent to your confirmation of 1829. Let me likewise have one Grant

of 1825 properly endorsed by you in Blank & one under date of 1826
restating in both a sum of money paid as consideration for the same
8th Now for the most important points viz. to send me the origin-
al Document or documents which you refer to as having the
Consul Seal & signed affixed with any other such direct or
indirect proofs or acknowledgements from any of the English
Authorities, from which I hope at least to show your good
grounds, if not right to transfer &c & the thereby further con-
victed validity for the grantees to receive &c &c.

9th I am daily looking for your further communications rela-
tive to the Sheep of your friends & his grant prior to the
British Protest, with the name & a letter to his London King
with whom I will cordially cooperate?

10th Annexed a Prospectus (with the names of a few friends
of mine who are ready to cooperate soon as God will
allow us) which I wish you to advise me of any
alterations suggestions &c &c. when you deem advisable?

11th Do you believe that there are any mines of Coal, Iron
Copper &c in the Falklands?

I have this instant heard two reports, the one that the Admiralty have sent
to the Falkland a Frigate with 50 odd ^{to Rio} marines & provisions for 4 mo., the
other that the Colonial Office had removed ^{to Rio} Smith & his Party & did
not intend to maintain any Garrison there! - I shall know the truth &
write you again shortly, I am faithfully yours,
