

Buenos Ayres June 16<sup>th</sup> 1836.

Woodbine Parish Esq<sup>r</sup>



Sir.

Since my last of 13<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> last,  
I have been without your favours. I was then  
still endeavouring to get resources to get to  
the Falklands, but was disappointed  
for a considerable time, until at length I  
came to an arrangement with General D<sup>r</sup> Juan  
Ant<sup>r</sup> Lavalleja, to send to the Island a  
cargo of horses and some twenty gauchos, and  
to domesticate for me the wild cows and calves,  
and to kill the bulls for the benefit of oil;  
but the season being now far advanced the  
undertaking will not likely sail before the  
month of August. Lavalleja is very capa-  
ble for this kind of business, and knows what  
men to send, and if he hears of there being  
much cattle, he may probably go himself,  
being now perfectly at leisure and very anxious  
to better his fortune. He had proposed me  
this same business in 1830, but we could not  
then agree, probably because he has too many  
attentions of another nature in the Banda  
Oriental. With Mr. Mendenhall we rec'd.  
here the news that Mr. Morris was preparing  
to go to the U.S., but this is a mistake. Morris  
had declined going until the month of

April, and believing that this Govt would  
consent to the delay, he may have been making  
some preparations to go; but his excuse  
was admitted, and Alwear chosen to go to  
the U. S. It is difficult however to know  
when he may be dispatched.

In expectation of soon hearing from you,
