Dear Sir

The vessel with which my foregoing of 25th Sept was intended to be sent, went on such very short notice, that my letter remained behind, and no vessel has gone since. This for Heaven.

Great changes have taken place in the Govt as you will see by the British packets of 12th 19th 25th 27th 29th 30th of Sept which I send you herewith.

The vanquished Party having now got a life of the overwhelming majority of Genl Rosas's party will probably submit with patience to being well or ill governed, and we may in consequence thereof expect many years of tranquillity. Every Governor, as long as Rosas's influence lasts, is only nominally Governor, Rosas is it in reality. Genl Balcarce soon after Genl Rosas having undertaken the campaign against the Indians took courage, and began to govern as Governor, when he was soon foiled as you will see by the papers. If the new Governor Genl Vermont should attempt to be Governor he will, ^{also} soon cease to be Governor. Under such circumstances it is a very fortunate thing that Rosas is at bottom a very well inclined man, and naturally of a good understanding, and more capable of governing in this country without laws, than Genl Balcarce with laws.

No changes affect my interests, because, after having once got convinced that the great majority of the people here do not know what true liberty is, I shall not ~~undoubtedly~~ make it a practice not to meddle in their politics, and hence therefore many friends among all parties - besides such able ministers as Girds and Gascin will no doubt soon find resources for sending them to the U. S. - I see plainly that until then nothing can be done there in my affairs, and am further ^{inclined to think} that a settlement with the U. S. Govt will preclude the necessity of bringing lawsuits against individuals. I have now long been without sleep

from you, and am most anxious to hear of the resto-
rishment of your health, ^{ever} since you informed me
of your laboring under that painful (the most dangerous)
Disease, the Rheumatism.
