is being sufficient to prove  
that Capt Smith & Son contained my affairs  
out of Island - London 25<sup>th</sup> June 1835 On my arrival here in Jan<sup>t</sup> 1835

for the protection of the settlers of Yunnah the settlement  
and your property in other whr, however by kind  
of perseverance and with my own funds. Recovered the  
horses from the camp and reestablish'd the whole  
of your concerns. On the arrival of my son here last  
July, I put your affairs in his hands, giving him the  
~~surplus of monies for the date of Aug.~~ above he will  
be send you an account of his proceedings. I also sent  
a bill for 435 - Spanish dollars, and a bill for the  
~~seal skins taken at the mouth of South River, which taken~~  
from documents which I found here was establish'd by  
you or your agent. I have some lengthy correspondence  
on the subject, but as I was sent here to protect the in-  
habitants in their lawful pursuits, those inhabitants must  
starve or loose their money, should aliens participate in  
those privileges. The amounts of sales of seal skins  
which have been rendered by me to the Commander in  
chief up to the 1<sup>st</sup> of Aug 1835.

and at the same time I told him, I should insist on being remunerated for trouble and expense incurred. There are now 29 <sup>for</sup> sold hides thus  
besides the meat <sup>(See #1)</sup> which were taken away by  
the Custers Sassanah men, an a about 400 dry &  
salt hides, 50 or 60 head of fine cattle & 40 wild,  
30 working horses and 20 or 30 sheep.

Of these 400 hides, 140 had been human  
 acquired previous to Genl. Britton's arrival, See  
 & the remaining 260 hides had been from Mr. Stewart  
 acquired since. And according to a  
 letter rec'd from him in London dated 1st Month of  
 Octd 5 Novr 1852 he states that his son had  
 given up to him all the hide skins & money Commander  
 having for the sale of Beef to his (Lieut. Smith) and that their  
 appointment until he was superseded (by Lieut. Lowry) and that then  
 were 300 to 400 unmarketed cattle 800 dry and salt hides "being some sealskins  
 and they would have been more latter but they had been driven off long ago  
 by the American Indians & were by A. Semirel the Capt  
 "of the late Genl. Louis, for but supplied  
 his crew, the present Commander in Chief  
 Retired me to cancel. I replied it rested  
 with you, that I would acquaint you  
 with his orders. It rests with you to  
 comply or not, as you think most  
 No.

You will excuse my giving one piece of advice  
it requires several men & it will be hard to carry on the  
establishment properly, it will not do to frightened  
they'll eat it all up. If you have not the means  
to buy your property from some English Merchant or  
merchants, I have written to a Mr G. T. Whiting  
on the subject, who sent me out a prospectus of  
an Association he was forming to colonize the  
Island. W. Smith.
