To the commandor in chief of H. B. M. Naval forces on the South American Station.

I beg leave to refer to the letter I had the honor to address you on the 2nd instant, enclosing copies of various papers sent to the Late Admial of the Rio de Janeiro, Sir Michael Seymour, and of a letter addressed to H. Smith Esq^r, Governor of the Falkland Islands. You will observe therein that urgent attention had prevented me from attending personally to my commercial affairs at Port Louis, which I therefore had sent thither Mr Matthew Brisbane and several assistants, who having been unfortunately murdered, my affairs were again thrown into total confusion.

You will further observe that a certain arrangement is adopted in the settlement, then the yet existing elements necessary for the immediate good success of future settlement and for the present comfort of the garrison and of H. B. M's shipping, will soon be lost; to avoid this was the object of the letter to Lieut Smith, which being explicitly, might in some measure supply the want of experience in such matters, to enable that gentleman to preserve those elements until I may have of my own power to return there and reestablish my affairs on their former footing, especially that part which is ^{immediately} connected to H. B. M's service, the domestication of cattle in order to supply the garrison and H. B. M. shipping bound round Cape Horn, with good salt or fresh provisions, as also for furnishing all new Colonists with cows for dairies, oxen and native horses for tillage &c. But those elements, I mean the old well trained horses and the remaining experienced gauchos, though of the utmost importance until a sufficient number of new horses and gauchos can be sent thither, and be trained by the former, yet they are too few and too old to be serviceable much longer, so that if this summer is lost they may become useless altogether, and the training

of new ones will then be attended with the greatest difficulties, and with the loss of years of time, during which it will not be possible to have any command over the wild cattle, and consequently H.C.M. shipping and garrison will not get their desirable supply of fresh meat and go on but very poorly for a number of years, when the settlers cannot be supplied with what they now want the cattle. All these are facts which I could fully demonstrate were I not fearful of intruding too much on your time already.

I have long felt the necessity of re-establishing that important branch of business on the East Falkland Island, but the ruin of my affairs left me without the necessary resources to do so. In vain I have waited till now for the satisfaction of my claims; which claims, were they paid, I could offer abundant means, but it will not do to wait any longer, I must seek assistance elsewhere.

Under these circumstances, and being persuaded that you will feel an interest in the object in contemplation, particularly in as far as the public good is therein concerned, and presuming those Islands to be under your special care, I take the liberty of making you the following proposals:

If the Governor at Port Louis requires for the service of H.C.M. some of the houses which I built, there he is and has been welcome to the use of them, and I am also willing to sell any number of them, which may be required at a fair valuation. The enclosed plan of the inner harbour of Port Louis may serve to give some idea of the houses, of which No. 1 is by far the best, of the other houses I do not recollect well their sizes.

Further, I engaged to supply the garrison and H.C.M. shipping with beef at the rate of ten Spanish dollars per bullock. On account of such sale of buildings, and supplies to said garrison and

Shipping I would wish to receive an advance of 2000 £ ster.,
being expressly to be applied to the objects aforesaid.
If at any time H. M. Service should require the construc-
tion of other buildings so as to have no further use for mine,
then I engage to take them back again also at a fair val-
uation.

I further beg leave to observe that the most favorable
time for shipping horses is during the summer months, when-
for I shall be very thankful if you will honor me with
an answer for first opportunity under cover of the British
Consulate at Buenos Ayres.

Sir,

I beg leave to refer to the letter I had the honour to address you on the 2^d inst, enclosing copies of my letter of 2^d July to the late Mr. Leitch Seymour with seven documents regarding ~~several~~ ^{various} suggestions which had been made upon my property at the Settlement at the Malvinas Islands by private individuals after said Islands were placed under the British flag, & asking ~~said~~ property might be protected from further ruin —

You will observe in said letter that urgent attention had prevented me from attending personally to my commercial affairs at Port Louis, that therefore had sent ~~them~~ whether Mr. Matthew Brisbane and several assistants, who having been assassinated, my affairs were again thrown into total confusion. —

You will further observe that the preservation and promotion of the branch of business which I have followed of domesticating the wild cattle is a business of public utility to the Islands, in whatever way the question concerning question of sovereignty between the R. Arg. & British Government may be terminated, and also at all events a business of public utility to trade in general round Cape Horn; but the ruin of my affairs has left me without the necessary resources to continue the same under these circumstances, and considering

my self entitled to an indemnification for said
business having been destroyed ~~since~~ ^{upon} the Islands
~~were~~ are under H.B.M's Govt, which I shall
claim in due time ^{from H.B.M's Govt} and Considering that ~~these~~
that sorts of my horses ^{are} ~~are~~ occupied by men under

season being the most proper for the transportation
of horses, necessary for the reestablishing the cattle
business, I would be much obliged to you to
honour me with an answer for first opportunity
